

Health & Wellness Programs Focus on Cancer



Cancer and the importance of early detection were the focus of two health presentations at EVG. The discussion on breast cancer was held Oct. 24, and the lung cancer seminar was held on Nov. 7.

Joan Withers, RN, director of the Susan Komen Organization (JFK) showed slides on helpful tips for early detection of breast cancer through self-examination. She emphasized the importance of yearly mammograms.

The St. Barnabas Lung Cancer Institute's discussion on lung cancer stressed that this disease is most curable when diagnosed at an early stage. Respiratory specialist Roland Romano informed his audience of a free screening program at the Livingston facility for high-risk smokers. This free screening is part of the international Early Lung Cancer Action Program for early detection of the No. 1 cancer killer, whose number is way over that of all cancer deaths combined. High-risk smokers are current or former smokers, age 55-74. Eligible individuals should call 973 322-6644 for a free screening and low-dose CT scan.


Tell me this won't happen to us!!!!



Scan Member ID Cards Available in 2014

EVG members will be issued new ID cards in 2014, according to EVG Program Director Avril Carter. These cards will be required every time a member makes use of the facilities and will be scanned to provide information that will serve as the basis for needed services.

Aside from verifying that the user is a bona fide senior resident of Woodbridge Township, the card will provide valuable information such as where in Woodbridge most center patrons are from, age make up of users, and when the card was last used. Tracking card use will greatly assist hospitality volunteers keep track of prolonged absences that might be due to illness and enable them to periodically check on member well being. The data will also serve as a basis for the planning and implementation of new programs and services to benefit EVG seniors attain the stated goal of being the "friendliest, healthiest, and happiest seniors in all the USA."

There are 297 names in the current EVG roster of members. These are the members who have submitted their information by filling out the green Registration Form found on the table by the office. All members should fill out this form to ensure that they get this techno-friendly scan ID card.


Ann Fitzsimons EVG Senior Volunteer
